Members Fish Reports


Bob Pharoah fished Lake Miramar on December 15, 2010

I launched into 60 degree water at 7 AM. Fished across the lake into Bernardo Bay without a strike. I fished the left side of the Bay to the rear of the bay and hooked up around 8 AM. Between 8 AM and 10 AM I hooked 4 and landed 2 (13 & 19 inches). One LDR, one Netted fish took a Black Bead Bugger while the other landed fish was on an Orange Western Wiggler. I was joined in Bernardo Bay around 9:30 AM by Bruce Bechard in his kayak where he landed a nice fish. I fished around to Poway Arm, about one quarter of the way into the bay and back out to Woodson Point where I landed a nice 18 incher on the Black Bead Bugger. I fished on down to the pier in Penasquitos Arm then cut across to Ramona Point where I landed another 18 incher on the Black Bead Bugger. Bruce joined me for awhile then he crossed into Elliott Cove then fished down into the rear of Escondido Arm. He reported one LDR and 3 landed all on Orange Wigglers. I continued to fish down to the point



entering Starvation Cove. I landed another 3 fish during that time (19, 19 and 20 inchers), one on an Orange Wiggler and 2 on the Black Bead Bugger. I cut across and fished down into San Diego Arm. I fished all the former hot spots without a strike. I fished all the way to the rear of the Arm, back out and to the point at the entrance to Elliott Cove without a strike. I pulled everything up and headed for the launch ramp and home at 2:30 PM. Total for the day 2 LDRs and 6 landed.

Richard Debusk, Paul Costa, Mike Stone (my son-in-law) and I fished Tidelands this morning. We launched at 7:30 AM into 59 degree water temperature and the air temperature was "chilly". We fished about 2 hours and the fishing was slow. We did land 8 bass including 3 nice fish (2 14 inchers and 1 15 incher).

Jim Castelluzzo fished the East Walker River December 1, 2, 3, 2010

I was planning on putting up some photos in the monthly newsletter, but I screwed up the photo downloads of a few nice browns sitting on the snow along the banks of the Fast Walker.

The water was very low and the temps were cold. It was -20 in Bridgeport on 29 November. I fished on 1—3 December and caught several nice fish at the upper pool below the dam and the run just below. Primarily on streamers and nymphs.

I wouldn't make a special trip up there this time of year, but I was up there on work. The West Walker was closed.

Time for Another Trip to the Flaming Gorge

speak of the "Lodge" oriented trip where we fly to Salt Lake, rent and drive cars to the Flaming Gorge Resort and (optionally) hire floating guides (or wade on our own). The Flaming Gorge is a popular, blue ribbon tail water fishery with lots of healthy fish - rainbows, browns and cutts - and the gorge itself is 7 miles of pine covered, red-rock walls that rise from the translucent emerald waters. Accommodations are very comfortable and the lodge restaurant is very good. If one chooses to stay in a lodge condo, kitchenettes allow you to cook for yourself if you'd like.

Last year, the five day trip (3 fishing days sandwiched between 2 travel days) came in at around \$1,500 per person. That estimate includes airfare, car rental and gas, lodging, 3 guide days. Meals not included (except for lunches w/guides). Lodge accommodations and guide fees remain the same for 2011 but the 2011 rates for car rental, gas and airfare is uncertain.

I am looking at either May 23-27 or June 6-10 for the dates of the trip. This is later than we usually go. But by going later we have a better chance of avoiding the annual Spring jump in river flow rate and it'll be more likely that we'll be fishing the big, top water, terrestrial bugs in the afternoon.

I am hoping to have at least a dozen members (and/or friends & family) sign up for the trip before January 15. I have to balance different preferences (condo or motel?, guide or wade?) and the people who commit earliest have the best chance to get their choice.

If you are interested, here are the things I need to know:

- Which week do you prefer: May 23-27 or June 6-10?
- Would you still go if most people prefer a different week than you?
- How many floating guide days would you like (0 3) (split \$425+tax per day).
- Do you have a preference as to which guides you'd like to go with (or not go with)?
- Are you willing to be a driver for the 3.5 hour trip from between Salt Lake City and Flaming Gorge?
- Would you like to room with another fisher in a condo suite with kitchenette (\$159+tax/night) or a motel room (\$119+tax/night).
- Do you have any interest in splitting a condo 3 ways (1 sleeps on couchbed or fold-away bed).
- Would you be interested in a very early flight to Salt Lake (ETD 7:30 or earlier) in order to arrive at the Flaming Gorge in time to fish the late afternoon/evening on the day of arrival?

With this information I will:

- Determine an optimal round trip flight but you'll be responsible for making your own flight reservation.
- Make car, lodging and guide reservations.
- Assign people to cars, rooms and guides.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Burk's Aggravator Nymph

Prince Aggravator Nymph

Hook: TMC 200R, size 14 to 8
Head: Gold bead - sized for hook

Thread: Uni 8/0 Black (6/0 for larger patterns)

Tail: Amber/Cream CDC or sparse marabou for movement.

Rib: Copper wire for durablity (optional)

Body: Peacock Herl - 3-4

Legs: Rootbeer Sili-legs by Wapsi

Wing: White Goose biots

Wingcase: Brown Goose biots or turkey slips





Hare's Ear Aggravator

Hook: TMC 200R, size 14 to 8

Head: Black bead - Spirit River Bright Bead- sized for hook

Thread: Uni 8/0 Black (6/0 for larger patterns)

Tail: Amber/Cream CDC or sparse marabou for movement.

Rib: Pearl Krystalflash

Body: Tan Hare's Ear - Hareline's Hare's Ear Plus

Thorax: Peacock Herl

Legs: Rootbeer Sili-legs by Wapsi

he Aggravator nymph is one of those rare flies that catch fish in both rivers and lakes. It has proven its usefulness in catching smallmouth, largemouth, steelhead, rainbow trout, cutthroat trout, brown trout, brook trout, salmon and even panfish. This fly is a must-have in every fly box as it works under all kinds of conditions for almost anything with gills. To fish it in fast moving water an angler can either dead drift the fly through a fishy looking run or riffle or strip it actively against the current to try and get a

reaction strike. In stillwater a sinking fly line will get the fly to the big fish while the waving marabou tail and wiggly silicone legs should put any fish in the vicinity into a feeding frenzy.

I found two variations for those that love the Prince Nymph and the Hare's Ear. Follow the standard instructions, substituting the marabou for the tail and adding one or two pairs of Sili-legs to give the classic patterns new life and movement. - Lucky Ketcham



"How To"...SDFF Meeting Set-up and Breakdown 2011

SET UP

- > Arrive by 6:30 PM
- ➤ Unlock SDFF cabinets (located on stage left) combination lock # 1-2-3
- > Carry name-tag cases to back of auditorium. Cases are located adjacent to cabinets
- > Someone is usually there by 6:00 PM to set up condiment table and start coffee
- Move salad bar tables flat against the wall (if they are set up)
- > Set up tables next to back windows for name tag boxes
- > Arrange table for raffle ticket sales
- ➤ Arrange 2-3 tables in front of stage steps for raffle items
- > Set up club P.A. system (found in cabinets on stage)
- > Set up slide projector (extension cord in cabinet) and pull down screen in back of stage
- Make sure faculty restrooms are unlocked and hall lights are on (see custodian)
- > Check with custodian about heater for auditorium if needed
- ➤ Put out large trash cans and recycle bin (from teacher's lounge)
- > Set up 10 rows of 10 chairs (5 chairs on each side of aisle)

BREAKDOWN

- > Be sure all chairs and tables are returned to original positions
- > Check and clean up trash, spills, and crumbs
- > Turn off and put away microphone, screen and projector
- > Return coffee pot, condiment box, blue bin, and name tag boxes to cabinet. LOCK CABINET!
- > Custodian is responsible for shutting down and locking up, but please double check any windows that may have been opened.

It is important that we return this room to the same order as we found it as the school uses this room first thing in the morning and they have no time to rearrange before the kids arrive.


