Who needs another level of stress traveling to a wonderful area for a life experience which should help you relax a little and get you pumped by the size of these fish?



Giant Squid

f you have ever wanted to fight a quarry on equal terms with your largest fly rod, here is your chance! Find a friend with a boat and head out off Mission Beach until the water depth has reached 50 to 80 fathoms.Club member Marvin **Darling** and I had an incredible morning on the 10th of March. We stopped on splashing schools of mackerel (also a worthy opponent). Using our conventional tuna rods, we dropped down heavy squid jigs to the bottom. Soon, we were pulling on giant squid. The trick is to bring one squid up from the bottom and all his hungry friends will follow. Eventually, the

strange sight of the basket-like tentacles and a flashing red/white body emerged from the dark blue gloom. Surrounding the stricken Cephalopod were ten more hungry squid. I made a short cast with my 12 -weight fly rod, sinking line and homemade, feathered squid jig fly. Four monsters squirted towards the fly and proceeded to battle one another for the tasty morsel! The largest one triumphed; grabbing my fly and commencing a run out along the surface that took my entire fly line and most of my two hundred yards of backing. Marvin fired up the boat and gave chase. After an arduous fight of perhaps fifteen minutes we were able to gaff aboard the 21- pound angry Giant Squid. We then played catch and

release with other hungry squid until our failing arm muscles told us that it was time to go home. The squid will hit any large fly but the best fly for this game is the lightest commercial plastic squid catcher you can find. Tie on a tail of chicken feathers around the tynes and you are ready to go. Use the heaviest fly rod that you can get your hands on and be sure to use a 40pound shock tippet to protect the leader from the rough tentacles. The squid are fast growing, very fecund organisms. They are usually found off Peru, but lately have been caught as far north as Sitka, Alaska. How long they stay around is anyone's guess, but now may be the time of a lifetime!

FLY OF THE MONTH

HIT AND RUN

This is a nymph pattern developed by Trapper Badovinac. He demonstrated it at our February meeting and also describes it in his book Fly Fishing Montana's Missouri River. There are a couple differences between this version and the one in his book. Instead of using pheasant tail for the tail, wing case and legs, in the book he uses partridge. Instead of peacock herl for the thorax, in the book he uses hare's ear dubbing. I think those variations would work better for the smaller sizes, but either way it makes a great looking fly.

HOOK: TIEMCO 2457 size 14-20

BEAD: Gold 2mm THREAD: Brown 8/0

TAIL: Pheasant tail (or Hungarian partridge)


Red holographic tinsel BODY:

3X tippet wound brassie style RIB:

Peacock herl (or light brown hare's ear dubbing) THORAX:

WING CASE: Same as tail


Same as tail and wing case LEGS:



- 2. Tie in about six pheasant tail barbs for the tail and wrap thread back to the start point. Do not trim.
- 3. Tie in 3X tippet and wrap thread back to
- 4. Tie in tinsel and wrap thread back to the starting point. Trim excess.
- 5. Wrap the tinsel forward to the starting point, tie off and trim.
- 6. Wrap the tippet forward tightly as you

- would a brassie. Tie off and trim.
- 7. Take a wrap of the thread in front of the pheasant tail. Tie in two strands of peacock herl. Wrap several times to form the thorax. Make sure that you go back slightly overlapping the abdomen and come forward just behind the bead. Tie off and trim.
- 8. Pull the pheasant tail over the thorax to form the wing case. Tie off just behind the bead.

 9. Split the pheasant tail into two equal bundles.
- Tie back and down, one section on each side, to form the legs.
- 10. Whip finish and cut your thread.
- 11. Trim legs to the point of the hook.
- 12. Go fishing.

Re: URGENT – Request to Emergency Senate Natural Resources Committee Meeting regarding DWR Certification of Environmental Impact Report (State Clearinghouse # 2004051123) – Middle Piru Creek

Dear Senator Kuehl:

California Trout, Inc. is making an urgent request of you to call an emergency hearing of the Senate Natural Resources Committee in Los Angeles. This hearing will allow the individuals who are most affected by the Department of Water Resources's (DWR) plan to dewater Piru Creek (Los Angeles Co.) to comment on the proposal. Please find attached the March 1, 2005 *Los Angeles Times* article detailing the DWR's plan ("*Creek Croaks*…").

The DWR, operating under the auspices of the Schwarzenegger Administration, claim that drying up a stream is good for one of California's native species—but this fiasco is not about species protection. Unfortunately, the plan instead is a money savings tactic to benefit the DWR that additionally breaks a mitigation promise made to Californians when Pyramid Dam was built in 1972. Our persistent inquiries about these issues have been posed to Governor Schwarzenegger's staff and have hereto date been ignored and unanswered while concurrently the DWR has approved this misguided project. (see *Los Angeles Daily News* February 9, 2005 article attached).

We are calling on you as Chair of the Senate Natural Resources Committee to call an emergency meeting so that the California State Senate and your constituents can expose the truth about DWR's plan:

- Dewatering Piru Creek to protect the Arroyo Toad will jeopardize other federally listed species such as the Willow Nat Catcher and Southern California Steelhead each of these species are legally required to utilize streams with an adequate quantity of water.
- The National Marine Fisheries Service has determined the genetics of wild rainbow trout in Piru Creek are similar to the endangered Southern California Steelhead yet the DWR claims that trout in Piru Creek are not of particular importance.
- DWR claims they are being forced to take their proposed action, yet the *Los Angeles Times* and *Los Angeles Daily News* revealed that no such demand has been made by the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) who has jurisdiction over the federally listed Arroyo Toad. To the contrary, the USFWS is opposed to protecting the toad if it harms Southern California Steelhead trout.

- Current water releases in Piru Creek are benefiting the Arroyo Toad. ("The {current} modified releases have benefited arroyo toads in that drainage." (US Forest Service, 1999. *South California Mountains and Foothills Assessment*)
- DWR's plan will undermine the highly successful and popular *Trout in the Classroom* program enjoyed by thousands of Los Angeles area elementary children.
- DWR admits its plan will destroy a highly popular and rare trout fishing stream located adjacent to the Los Angeles metropolitan area which would also adversely affect the local economy due to a loss of recreational expenditures.

California Trout have raised the above facts to the Schwarzenegger Administration via Mike Chrisman, Secretary for the Resources Agency. We asked the Secretary to postpone the certification of DWR's Environmental Impact Report but again, our letter to Mr. Chrisman and other inquiries were ignored.

California Trout is not suggesting that the DWR's efforts to establish a comprehensive and possibly modified management scheme for Pyramid Lake be terminated. To the contrary, we are ready to work with all interested parties in order to get this program back on track at the earliest possible time.

Thank you in advance for your attention and action to this urgent request. I will call your office early next week to discuss scheduling a Senate Natural Resources Committee hearing in Los Angeles.

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

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
