Jim, thank you for your generosity over the years.







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

FROM THE CONSERVATION CHAIR

Thanks to the generous financial and hands-on support of the San Diego Fly

Fishers membership, 2001 has been a great year for conservation. For those of you that may have missed a few meetings or Finny Facts articles, I thought it would be helpful to summarize the conservation and education activities the membership engaged in this past year.



SHERRY BRAINERD

The restoration of steelhead in San Mateo Creek has become a focus of many folks interested in local conservation. Several club members have put on their hiking boots and visited the stream with Allen Greenwood of San Diego Trout. For those of you that don't know, Allen is the person who has been leading the charge to restore the stream. From Allen and others, we've learned about the biology and the challenges involved in restoration.

From on-the-ground site visits, many of us have progressed to the scientific research lab. Several folks attended an "introduction to fish rearing" gathering at Hubbs Sea World Research Institute. Once the permit process is complete, we will become the surrogate parents for a bunch of baby steelhead and chub. When they are old enough, these fish will be planted back into San Mateo Creek. They then will form a new generation of breeding native fish.

Before the fish can go home, though, the stream needs to be made a bit more hospitable. Nonnative plants and animals introduced over the years will need to be removed. People have badly degraded the

steelhead fishery during the past century, and now people will be trying to undo

some of those mistakes. So far, there have been two weekend clean-up projects open to club members, and in the future there will be more.

In addition to these hands-on activities, the San Diego Fly Fishers board also put your money to use. After researching the groups involved in the San Mateo

Creek project, we determined that California Trout was doing an excellent job both on San Mateo Creek and on steelhead restoration throughout Southern California. Their conservation director, Jim Edmondson, has been the chair of the Southern California Steelhead Coalition—the working group of everyone involved in the issue. So, we had Jim come and give a program to the club on CalTrout's activities. We then presented him with a \$3,000 contribution to CalTrout to be used for Southern California issues and activities.

We have made some major progress toward getting steelhead back into a local stream. But, what about the rest of the conservation issues? This year, a lot of folks have been concerned about the future of our sport. Groups such as PETA have been spending a lot of time and money trying to convince kids that fishing is bad. The video game industry is providing children with total indoor virtual entertainment. If those groups succeed, it is quite possible that the next generation will not be interested in a wonderful sport, and they won't be trying to protect and restore the forests and watersheds crucial to healthy streams. In order to make sure that we have clean water for generations to come, we need to teach the importance of a healthy environment.

In order to make a contribution to local conservation education, the board decided on a two-pronged approach. First, we will be donating club fly fishing equipment and a cash payment of \$250 to Hugh Marx's children's fishing education program at Lake Cuyamaca. Hugh is a fly fisher, and he does an excellent job teaching kids the basics of fishing. During the first quarter of next year, Hugh will be making a presentation to the club.

Second, on a more global scale, we decided to support one of the most important local nonprofits in the conservation education arena. As many of you know, the San Diego Fly Fishers' steelhead educational exhibit is at the Chula Vista Nature Center. What you may not know is that the Center teaches thousands of kids and their teachers about local ecosystems and conservation. We had Error! Bookmark not defined., the Center's program director, come and speak to the club about the Center's activities. We then made a \$1,000 contribution to help fund their new trout education program. Those thousands of kids and educators will now be taught about such things as local watersheds, the existence and needs of trout and steelhead within those watersheds, human impacts on streams, and the historical significance of fish to local native cultures. Great stuff to launch future conservationists and fly fishers!

Thanks to all of you, 2001 really was a great year for conservation activities. Even better, we've still got some money in the bank to start off 2002. So, if you are interested in helping out with conservation, see me at the January meeting, or whenever the urge to volunteer strikes you!

"How To"...SDFF Meeting Set-up and Breakdown

SET UP

- Arrive by 6:15 PM
- Unlock SDFF cabinet (located on stage left) combination lock #1-2-3-4
- Carry locker contents and blue plastic bin (on floor next to cabinet) to back of auditorium
- Vernon Wescott is usually there by 6:00 PM to set up condiment table and start coffee
- Set up tables next to back windows for name tag boxes
- Arrange table for raffle ticket sales
- Arrange 2-3 tables in front of stage steps for raffle items
- Set up microphone (located in box next to power panel stage left, top level)
- Set up slide projector and screen (extension cord in cabinet)
- Make sure faculty restrooms are unlocked and hall lights are on (see custodian)
- Check with custodian about heater for auditorium if needed
- Put out large trash cans and can recycle bin (from teacher's lounge)
- Set up 10 rows of 16 chairs (8 chairs on each side of aisle)

BREAKDOWN

- Be sure all chairs and tables are returned to original positions




