As this is an awards banquet, recognition was given to those who have given of themselves during the year to



Carp Revisited

Taught my first common carp recently. Of all places it was in the Eastern Sierra at the end of the trout season. After proudly announcing my feat to several anglers, I was reminded of the commonly held tenet that all carp are "trash" fish. I really don't understand this view as carp are wary and tenacious fighters. Sure, they vacuum the bottom but so do catfish and they're not so poorly regarded. And, hey, they're edible!

Carp are broad-shouldered omnivorous fish of a coppery or brown color but are probably best distinguished by their large scales and orange-tinged ventral fin. They exist in many freshwater environments. Lake Skinner has a sizeable population and Lake Morena was famous for them. As I said, they're tenacious. In fact, they pull like a MACK truck; they just don't jump when attached to the end a hook and line.

Just prior to the San Diego

wildfires, I float tubed a lake on Camp Pendleton that I'd not fished in over a year or so. The reason for this was that a large-scale fish kill had taken place about two years ago...probably due to lake "turnover". Anyway, I was pleasantly surprised to see several aerators and fish 'rings' everywhere early one morning when I arrived. A few boils close to shore revealed common carp and with my recent experience under my belt, I took up the challenge.

I'm probably well known for throwing a "DB bugger" at anything that swims and yes folks, it works on carp too! However, experimentation seemed to favor a "woven" fly - a 'bug-like' creation somewhat similar to a "woolly bugger". I picked up a few nice fish that morning and subsequent trips have yielded fish to 10+ lbs. (I now possess a BogaGrip which tends to make less a liar out of me).

Carp are almost as wary as

their white amur vegetarian cousins (grass carp) but when they are 'gulping' air in groups (they are one of only a few fish species able to absorb oxygen this way), they are more susceptible to a fly. A quietly placed #4 - #6 'woven' fly can get a light take followed by a furious tug-o-war that can persist for more than 5 mins. on a 5wt. fly rod. Pull too hard and you might break the hook! Once landed, however, carp reveal soft, rubbery lips and flies are easy to remove. Also, due to their 'gulping' ability, photo ops can be longer than normal without detriment to the fish.

Some morning visits revealed not rings but bubbles on the lake's surface...yep, the fish were probably vacuuming. However, persistence in 'leading' the bubble trails (with a sinking line) together with a very cautious approach yielded hookups. Probably the most important tactic is the quiet approach, as carp seem

FLY OF THE MONTH

"ILLEGAL FLY" aka modified Beaded Carey Special

Materials

Hook: 2xl #12 with a clear bead with a silver center installed behind the hook eye

Thread: Black or brown UNI - 8/0

Tail: Well marked teal flank or mallard flank

Rib: Copper or Gold Fine Wire

Body: 4 Strands of Peacock Herl or Pheasant Tail Fibers

Hackle: Partridge or Mallard Flank

You can mix and match the various materials, it is your option. The bead is the key.



- 1. Debarb the hook and put the bead on the hook. Then tie in the ribbing material
- 2. Tie in the Tail. The tail should be about 1/3 the length of the hook shank. It can also be tied without a tail.
- 3. Select 4 strands of peacock herl. Tie in by the tip on top of the hook shank. Strengthen the material by wrapping it around the tying thread forming a herl rope
- 4. Wrap the herl rope around the hook shank from the curve of the hook to just behind the
- Reverse wrap the ribbing material forward the length of the body re-inforcing the body material.
- 6. Add one or two turns of hackle just behind the bead.
- 7. Whip finish and apply head cement behind the bead.

This fly catches fish. It has caught so many that it acquired the name "Illegal Fly". Like all flys it does not work all of the time. It is the clear bead with the silver center that triggers the strike.

John got the fly pattern from a Randy Jones and Randy Stonebraker fly tying class held at the 1998 FFF International Conclave.

It is a take off from the Carey Special which has been around for a long time.

It works well at Cuyamaca, Poway, Crowley and Ellery Lakes. It also works at Henry's Lake Idaho and Hebgen Lake, Montana.

John, thank you for doing the Fly of the Month.

If you are a stillwater fisherman you need some of these. Good Tying and Good fishing.






