

Alex Ramirez BIO

Alex Ramirez began his fly fishing career on the South Fork of the San Joaquin River at the age of 10 chasing wild trout. Trout Eggs are Coming Soon

The start of the Trout in the Classroom is starting soon at three local schools with active, or near active tanks which include Kearny High School and Whittman Elementary School located in the city of San Diego and River Valley Charter School in Lakeside. The eggs are coming from Mojave Hatchery, but someone needs to meet them halfway which is the current problem. **Bob Forthun**, the local lead on this program stated, "**PLEASE reach out to the San Diego Fly Fishers for help with this.**" And we will respond as we have arranged pick up of eggs in Ontario, transportation to San Diego, and distribution to the three schools. Obviously they must be a member and carry the permits as well as Protocols for egg transportation.

The eggs are as you know, *fragile*, and we need them in all three aquariums as quickly as possible. **Bob Forthun** will be coordinating with Teachers, Principals, support staff, etc. at all three schools to make sure the eggs will be handled quickly and safely.

San Diego Fly Fishers made the commit-



ment to support this worthwhile program which provides important science lessons for the students at local schools provides potential stocking fish for local streams to support native trout populations. For example, the recent drought had dried-up Boulder Creek and the native trout population perished. These eggs offer a great opportunity to re-populate this stream when they grow to a proper size.

This marks a new era for **SDFF** as we will provide support to help the schools as a precursor to establishing this program at the new **Discovery Center** of the **San Diego River Park Foundation** and schools across San Diego County will be able to access these trout without making the expensive purchases to equipment. Exposing as many students as possible to the importance of this program generates future supporters of programs that seek to enhance fisheries that are under stress.



Fly of the Month

M&M Caddisfly – dry fly adult, size 18



Ventral view of a caddisfly, note the shape you want to cut the wing.

Materials

Hook: Standard Dry Fly, TMC 100 or 101 size 18
Thread: Black fine 10 or 14
Body: Two peacock herl Underwing:mWhite or Cream Antron Yarn
Wing: Wood duck breast or flank feather, tented and cut caddis wing style
(Wood duck is more mottled and marked than mallard or even light partridge LK)
Hackle Legs: Grizzly or Ginger, stiff dry fly hackle

October 1, 2010

I asked John Williams of Orange County Fly Casters for a recommended dry fly for Hot Creek Ranch for the first week in October. Bruce Harris is preparing for a short trip to the private resort that requires dry flies only be used for their trout.

Hi Lucky,

I would use a size 18 M&M caddis.

Here are the instructions, it's easy. #18 dry fly hook, 10/0 or 14/0 Black thread, Two peacock herls, White or cream Antron yarn, One wood duck flank feather, Grizzly or Ginger hackle. Wrap the shank with thread, tie in the peacock herl and wrap counter to the normal direction to the 2/3 forward position, wrap the thread in the opposite direction to trap it and let the thread hang at the 2/3 forward position. Tie in the Antron yarn and let extend just beyond the hook bend. Fold the wood duck feather by coaxing it into a tent shape, lay it on top of the Anton and tie in with several wraps. Tie in the hackle feather at the 2/3 point and make three wraps and tie off. Whip finish and head cement. "**The M & M Caddis is the most effective caddis ever.**" (Emphasis added by Lucky) Take Care Lucky. John

M & M Caddis *continued from page*

Hook: Standard Dry Fly, TMC 100 or 101 size 16 --- or 2XLong 1XF TMC 5212 Thread:
Yellow 8/0

Body: Brown SLF dubbing

Rib: Yellow thread or very fine gold wire.

Underwing: White or Cream Antron Yarn, or Clear

Wing: Partridge or Wood duck breast or flank feather, tented and cut caddis wing style (Wood duck is more mottled and marked than mallard or even light partridge LK)

Hackle Legs: Grizzly or Ginger, stiff dry fly hackle (Brown dyed grizzly)

I like to use a fine extra long hook on the size 16 caddis patterns. A standard hook, works but I think the longer segmented abdomen is part of the trigger on caddisfly and stonefly patterns.

Mount the hook and attach the yellow thread with a jamb knot at the 2/3 hook shank. I was taught to use the knot to make the wing tie in point and end of the abdomen. Make a tight thread base to just above the barb. Leave the 3 or 4 inch long tag for future use as a rib. Tease out a fine noodle of dark brown extra fine dubbing. (It can be green or other colors)

Make a cigar shaped body ending at the tie in point. I like a tight dubbed body. To get this I catch the fine tips of the dubbing noodle and make a wrap or two. Then take hold of the noodle and twist it to tighten the fibers. You have much more control of the body shape with this technique. End the body at the 2/3 shank position. (Caddisflies and Stoneflies have longer abdomens than mayflies, I stop the mayfly bodies at mid shank.) Half hitch the thread and place bobbin in the thread arm.

I use a rotary vise to make tight even segments in the abdomen with yellow thread. Secure and trim the rib. Take three strand clear or white Antron yarn, cut off 3 inches and separate the 3 strands. One strand should be enough of an underwing on a size 16. Attach the Antron to the top of the hook with 3 or 4 tight wraps. Take care to keep on top of the hook. Trim the front near the hook eye. The butt ends should be just at the bend of the hook. Trim if necessary.

Wood duck is good for this pattern, but it is more expensive than mottled partridge. They work about the same to me. Select a nice partridge feather. It should not be too curved in the quill and sized appropriate for the hook. (I sit and pull off fluff and excess fibers of partridge breast feathers in preparation for caddis fly construction. It makes a simple project for watching TV and preparing materials. I have containers of prepared mallard, partridge, pheasant and wood duck.

Attach the top wing by the bare quill at the 2/3 shank mark, size the wing to be at the bend and just past the Antron. I try to pull forward on the quill to compress the feather fibers for the correct profile.

You might pinch the feather and trim the ends to have the caddis wing shape. Most of the time I do not try to cut them. Pick feathers with a good shape and it is not really necessary. Secure and trim the quill. The dry fly hackle on this pattern is sparse and just represents the legs. I select a saddle hackle that can be one hook size larger. Trim off the barbs on the end for a clean tie down. Place the quill next to the bare hook and secure. Hackles hold better if they are attached to bare hook or tight thread. Problems come when you try to secure them to soft dubbing or in this case the slippery Antron layer. On this pattern I only make two wraps of hackle and secure. Three tight wraps of thread will hold most materials.

I use a half hitch tool to push back any stray hackle fibers over the hook eye and

then a three wrap whip finish. I don't usually need to add head cement. When I trim the excess hackle I will turn the fly upside down and trim off the bottom of the hackles at the same time.

I want the fly to land with the body on the surface of the water. Take the time to make sure the long segmented body is clearly visible. That means pulling up on the Antron, using your finger nail to move fibers or even trimming any yarn that hides the body.

The tent wing caddisfly patterns have worked for years. The addition of the Antron Sparkle Yarn seems to improve the pattern. They float a bit better and the sparkle highlights the segmented body shape.

Eastern Sierra Report from Tom Loe of Sierra Drifters

Upper Owens River 1/13/16

Significant snow on the ground here may be in sight over the next couple weeks. Most days the ice never stops forming on your rod guides. There is enough snow on the two track roads to get you stuck without an all wheel drive vehicle. The “snow bows” have increased in numbers recently. Flows have come up improving overall conditions. Crowley has completely iced over, & is at the highest water level in two years already. This has triggered a solid push of winter run rainbows to move upstream onto the gravel beds. During the warmer periods a few smaller rainbows and browns have also been active adding to the fish counts. Timing the weather is the key to getting on these trophy fish.

When we get an extended period of sub-zero air temps; it forces the LADWP to flush the standing ice out of the Rush Creek Diversion and washes debris, & ice bergs down the channel. Eddies will become solid sheets of ice making the river unfishable. If air temps warm enough, & the flushing is successful-the river can clean up in the afternoon. Overall water clarity has become poor below Hot Creek. The fish are very spread out, & are actively on their redds during warmer periods. They vacillate from the gravel beds into the deeper pools when we experience a duration of colder air temps. I have seen a few honey holes that have multiple fish in them; but this year you can expect one or two bigs per spot for the most part. Most popular attractor patterns will get you looks with solid drifts. SJ worms, crystal Vanderleechees, crystal soft eggs, Assassins, and Agent Orange patterns have got us into them while nymphing below an Under-cator.

Please don't squeeze the egg laden hens near the belly for a quick picture. That will cause the roe to discharge prematurely. Air temperatures below ten degrees can “flash freeze” the gills if you keep the fish out of water for more than a minute. Look for oval depressions that appear brighter, or scraped clean on the riffles below pools.

These are active spawning nests; or “redds” and you must avoid stepping on them.

[The section upstream from the Benton Bridge is open year around, down from the bridge is now closed to ALL angling. Special regs are in place here year around.](#)

Middle Owens River (Bishop area) 1/13/16

The “catching” continues to be fair on guided drift boat trips. Big fish have been shy, 18 inchers being the largest we are seeing. Streamer fishing using Crystal leeches, Loebergs, Punk Perch, & [Spruce-A-Bu's](#) with a moderately weighted sinking tip lines can be a good call for winter fishing.

Flows remain low, & the LADWP realtime gauge does not work accurately at times below 100cfs. Wading the WT section below PVR at this level is very easy. Water temps have dropped into the low forties. Under these conditions the fish will migrate into the deeper pools and runs. You will continue to see blue winged olives (BWO's), & midges present below the dam at PVR through the winter months during warmer periods. Have some #16/18 light bodied adults. The adult midges are very small- #20-24 and can be difficult to see. I suggest you use a dry/dry rig with the lead fly being a hi-vis para mayfly adult pattern 2-3 feet from the smaller point fly. Nymphing below an Under-cator with Assassins, flash back pheasant tails, and small gillies, crystal emergers/pupa patterns, zebra midges when the hatch is off. Dry/dropper bead head rigs can be effective in the riffles during the hatches. Hi-vis mayfly patterns are my choice for the dry.

Hot Creek 1/13/16

There is snow in the canyon. Water flows have come up thanks to run-off from Mammoth Creek, & conditions are good. On

warmer days the “catching” has improved for sure. You may experience heavy ice in the softer eddies, & pools during sub-zero air temps. Midges & attractor patterns are best during winter months. Very small pheasant tails, & bird's nest patterns are best for nymphs. Small parachute midge; or mayfly patterns used with a 10 foot leader are best for surface presentations when the fish are on the midges/or clusters. SJ worms, crystal eggs, & crystal leeches good calls in the deepest pools. There are a few sections that can be fished with a dry dropper nymph rig.

The Gorge 1/13/16

Fishing can be good during warmer cycles if you do some hiking and get away from the sections that get pounded. No snow here currently. The Gorge could be classified as the true “tailwater” from Crowley Lake. The fish here are all wild browns with a large one going 16 inches. Moderate/difficult hiking is required to access the more secluded sections. Rock hopping and bush whacking can be expected. Dry/dropper bead head nymph combos work well in the deeper pools. Use PT's, Assassin birds nest, broken back midges, tiger midges, & crystal olive larva patterns as the nymphs. Hi-vis para BWO's, Stimulators, parachute midge adults, & elk caddis, & hi-vis caddis are good choices for your dry fly. Pack in water, have cleated wading boots and a stout staff. 2-4wt. rods are perfect for this water. Snakes may be out early!
